## ABOUT THE CONFERENCE

A new radically approach to local accountability, and the pressure to maintain a visible policing presence will pose serious challenges to the current police service. The need for effective policing to reduce crime, in smarter ways with limited resources, has become a constant refrain to meet the challenges of contemporary crime and disorder in this rapidly changing climate.

The international police conference is intended to provide a platform for an exclusive view on principled policing in the 21st century. While the participants are expected to come mainly from the ASEAN and the region, recourses and the expertise will be drawn from international countries. The World Bank's most recent annual report connected some very important but often overlooked dots between conditions of war and violence and the absence of economic development. In seeking economic development, preconditions of social capital must be first put in place. Economic development cannot happen under conditions unfavourable for predictable risk and enjoyment of future returns. Security of life, liberty and property – enforcement of title and contracts – minimal abuse of power and oppression – call forth economic progress. In any society, those who enjoy these amenities prosper more than those denied their advantages.

Principled policing is the foundation for progress and for social justice. There is no more important precondition for rapid economic, social and cultural development than principled policing. Where policing is unprincipled, corruption and rent seeking throttle in the crib many entrepreneurial efforts, particularly among those without capital resources and dependent on favourable patronage. Where policing is unprincipled, the Rule of Law cannot emerge nor can human rights be fully respected. Where policing is unprincipled, judges are compromised and lawyers are irrelevant defenders of fairness and justice.

Evil was once defined as the “hole in the center of the donut”. It's right in front of us but we don't see it; it takes up space that we see as not worth noticing.

So to when we conventionally affirm the importance of the Rule of Law or democracy as preconditions for social justice and economic development, there is a hole in the center of the donut. What we overlook – what holds up disrespect for the Rule of Law or betrays democratic responsibilities – is policing.

The Principled Policing Conference is structure to capture experience-based observations and produce guidelines to enable current and aspiring police personal to achieve and sustain success in today's globalised and competitive world. The conference will be jointly organised by The Royal Malaysia Police and in association with the Caux Round Table and International Institute for Public Ethics, on 13 and 14 February 2012 in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.
